Daily spelling sessions are run for children based on the lesson structure promoted through phonics teaching of 'Revisit and Review', 'Teach and Practise' and 'Practise and Apply'. Sessions run by covering the National Curriculum spelling expectations with spelling strategies specifically taught and 'challenge' words covered through repetition.

Spellings should be practised at home alongside lesson in school to further embed them into children's long-term memory. Children are tested every Friday. During the test, the children will asked to spell **only 10 words** from each week. This will be 9 words from the main rule(s) and one challenge word. They receive **one house point** for correctly getting 9/10 or beating their previous score and **two house points** for correctly getting 10/10 in the test.
